



Ohio Grows as One of the Best States to Do Business!



Ohio has recently cracked the top ten list for the first time as one of the best states to do business, coming in at number 9. The study done by Area Development Online chose three categories and 18 sub-categories to measure each state by: business environment, labor climate, and infrastructure and global access. In the labor climate category Ohio is ranked 6th overall, with a ranking of 2nd in the availability of skilled labor sub-category. Ohio is ranked 4th overall in infrastructure and global access thanks to our central location, access to rail and highways, and water from the Great

Lakes.

These rankings come as no surprise to local citizens, especially thanks to Fortune 1000 companies that call Canton home to their regional and national offices such as American Electric Power, Diebold Inc., Marathon Petroleum, Chesapeake Energy, Republic Steel, and Old Dominion. Canton is also the global headquarters for TimkenSteel, a manufacturing company that is one of the top 30 largest companies in Ohio and one of the top 10 largest manufacturing companies in the country. Another large area of growth across the country is found in call-centers. Canton is



home to one of only six VXi Global Solutions locations in the United States, a company that is one of the largest employers in the City of Canton.

Jobs and businesses in Ohio are climbing up the national economic ladder, and Canton is largely to thank for that success. ♦

Canton Parks – Year in Review

As 2014 comes to a close, we hope that Cantonians have taken notice of the many changes in the parks over the course of the year. These new investments from the new park levy have only begun to scratch the surface of the overall needs in the parks. However, there are a wide variety of high profile and subtle investments that have improved the aesthetics and functionality of our parks while increasing the long term sustainability of our maintenance efforts.

The most surprising result of the levy has been the level of awareness that it has brought to our community partners about the needs in our parks. While the levy has resulted in over \$350,000 in capital investment into the park in 2014, our community partners have contributed an additional \$350,000 in matching funds for park projects. We are very thankful to the City of Canton, Canton Joint Recreation District, Stark Parks, ArtsInStark, The Timken Foundation, and countless other generous organizations and individuals who have generously supported Canton Parks in these efforts. The corresponding chart highlights over \$600,000 worth of the most notable investments.

With the support of our citizens resulting in the passage of the November 2013 Park Levy, Canton Parks is on the brink of another exciting year of redevelopment in 2015. The completion of a new land use assessment of all park properties for the first time since 1980 will be critical to the implementation of levy funds moving forward. We are thankful to all those who have provided feedback during our public meetings and survey responses. These inputs will help our consultants combine their experiences and best practices around the country with the needs and wants of park patrons to help develop a blueprint for all Canton Parks properties. We look forward to unveiling the full assessment in early 2015.

Grease: A Foe of Sewers

Oil and grease can cause sewers to back up. Most household and commercial wastewater contains a portion of liquefied grease that easily travels from sink to the public sewer. When this grease-laden flow cools, the problem begins. The most notable problem for sewers is the need for maintenance due to the clogging and restricting affect grease imparts on the inside of pipes. The second problem, and more of a frustrating dilemma, is the back up it can cause inside a house or a business.

When grease-laden sewer flow enters a pipe, the problem ultimately needs cleaned out. This effort can be costly to both the homeowners and operators of the sewer systems. On a smaller scale, homeowners are faced with handling the problem themselves or in some cases hiring a drain cleaner to remove the build up of grease. When oil and grease are heavily concentrated in areas such as multiple establishments, the effort to clean and remove can be time consuming in some cases. While most cases do not end up causing damage to the public sewer system, in some rare cases, the sewer can become damaged and require repairs that can be very costly.

The best practice to avoid such problems is to handle grease and oil separately. Keeping this material from the sink and disposing of it is a simple practice that can avoid problems to you and your neighbors.

If you are experiencing a sewer problem and you are city of Canton customer, please contact our department first. You can call 330.489.3031 during business hours or 330.649.5800 during off hours including weekends and holidays. Our crews will respond to the problem and inform you of their findings. ♦

Established in 2010, the Canton City E-Waste and Recycling Program is offered through a joint venture of the Canton City Health and Sanitation Departments. The Recycle Center is located at 742 Schroyer Ave., SW. Our 4th year of operation finds the facility continuing to grow as our efforts to recycle expand and change.

Thanks to the strong support of our community, the Recycle Center continues to run strong, providing a location where individuals can drop off tires (on or off the rim) and E-waste completely free of charge. E-waste is anything that has an electric cord or takes a battery. For a complete list of

acceptable items, go to: www.cantonhealth.org/eh/?pg=290. We encourage you to stop by Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10am - 2pm to drop off your unneeded items. In addition to the Recycle Center, citizens can participate in the curbside recycling through use of the blue recycle bins. These bins are for cardboard, paper, plastics 1-7, cans and glass. Do you have a blue bin to participate in recycling? If not, call Sanitation at 330.489.3020 to request one. ♦

The Nutcracker Is a Cherished Holiday Tradition

Under the artistic direction of Cassandra Crowley Canton Ballet will present its sparkling holiday showpiece *The Nutcracker* sponsored by Kenan Advantage Group in four performances December 12 – 14 at Canton's Palace Theatre. Performance times are Friday, 7:30PM; Saturday, 2PM and 7:30PM; and Sunday, 2PM.

Canton Ballet has offered its beloved audience favorite since its first public performance in 1968. The tale of *The Nutcracker*, written by E.T.A. Hoffman in 1816, has fascinated and inspired artists, composers, and audiences for almost 200 years. Its first presentation as a classic ballet took place at the Maryinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg, Russia, in 1892.

One of the brightest stars on northeast Ohio's annual holiday scene, Canton Ballet's *The Nutcracker* is presented in lavish sets and glittering costumes to the gorgeous music of Piotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky with choreography by Crowley, choreographer in residence Angelo Lemmo, and former assistant artistic director Carol Hageman.

In two acts *The Nutcracker* tells the story of a Christmas Eve in 1860 at the home of young Clara and her family during their holiday party. The mysterious magician Drosselmeyer makes a surprise visit and presents Clara with a very special Nutcracker doll. Thus begins the amazing journey of Clara and her Nutcracker prince—from a frenzied battle between life-sized toy soldiers and mice through the Land of Snow to the Land of the Sugar Plum Fairy.

It's Not Enough to Have SmArts

When ArtsinStark entered the scene almost ten years ago, it brought with it a tag-line of creating new jobs, smarter kids, and stronger communities.

And through grant awards, arts integration, and downtown development projects, that mission has pretty much stayed the course. But in the quest for making kids smarter through the arts, the ante, for ArtsinStark, has been upped. Recognizing GENIUS is now the goal, starting with the pre-school toddler and continuing through the cycle of lifelong learning and sustainable growth.

The success of last year's Genius Awards—resulting from ArtsinStark's 2020 Vision Plan for Innovation, and involving teams from area companies—led to an experiment. ArtsinStark's Education Coordinator Jennifer Hickman was charged with encouraging and recognizing "genius" in the South Summit neighborhood, an area loosely drawn between 12th Street to Tuscarawas/Monument to McKinley – the area closest to the Canton Arts District. Hickman's charge was to bring families together for one day friendly competitions that result in prizes, and are bordered with live music, free food, and arts activities – all specific to the unique flavor of the neighborhood.

The first Genius Games in the Summit Neighborhood occurred in October and had a Latin-American flare. The next two games open to kids, teens, adults, and families, residing in the area are slated for Saturdays December 13 and February 21. Unlike the October event (on Fulton and 4th), the winter games will be inside at the ArtsinStark Education Center on Cleveland Avenue. The final game will be back outdoors on Saturday, May 16.

Why the games? Why the neighborhood? Why genius? Because ArtsinStark wants to show that arts and learning can be fun. Because ArtsinStark wants to show that families working together with their neighbors can be fun. Because ArtsinStark believes, that with hope, a crazy idea, a few willing volunteers, and the chance to think creatively can not only build future collaborations, but also allow the individual genius in each participant to stand up and be rewarded.

The City of Canton and The Historic Onesto Lofts Bring Luxury Living Downtown

In August of 1930, Frank Onesto checked himself in as the first guest at the lavish Onesto Hotel. Some years went by and in 1974 the hotel closed its doors. After sitting empty for 40 years, the building has opened its doors back up, this time as the Historic Onesto Lofts; a luxury apartment building in the heart of Downtown Canton.

Steve Coon, owner of Coon Restoration and Sealants, Inc., was able to see past the decay that 40 empty years brought, and purchased the building with the intent to renovate it from the bottom up. He has done just that; the Historic Onesto has been restored to its original beauty. Coon went on a search for old photographs of the inside so he could recreate what the building looked like in the 1930s and he has been able to recreate the look and feel of the original hotel. Walking through the front revolving doors and up the original marble staircase into the grand lobby and ballroom feels like taking a step back in time.

Downtown Canton has been on the up and up over the past few years and the addition of the Onesto will only push downtown more into the spotlight and really help it to thrive.

“When this is finished, there will be 40 apartments being leased. That’s 40 more families living in downtown and that’s 40 more families spending their money in downtown,” Coon said.

The City of Canton and Canton City Council agreed to provide Coon with a \$2 million loan to put the finishing touches on the project. The loan was signed by Coon personally and will be repaid back to the city within 10 years. Once finished, the Onesto will boast 40 luxury residential apartments, a grand ballroom for large scale events, areas for private events, corporate apartments, a rooftop terrace, and retail space.

Ward 2 Councilman Thomas West calls this project “a game changer for Ward 2 and the City of Canton.”

“He’s bringing people downtown and businesses will flourish as a result of it,” West said at the September 15 Council meeting that approved the loan.

It wasn’t too many years ago that downtown really only flourished from 9-5 Monday through Friday. With the addition of the Arts District, restaurants, coffee shops, and other area businesses and events, downtown has become a premier place to be in Canton. With the addition of the Onesto, the people who are spending their time and money here now have a beautiful opportunity to live here as well.


“From 5:00 on, Monday through Friday, and all through the weekend, if we have people living downtown, our downtown area is going to flourish and our city will see a huge benefit from




that,” Ward 7 Councilman John Mariol mentioned during the September 15 Council meeting. He then added that “this is probably the most exciting vote I’ve made on Council.”

Canton is gaining some steam in the competition of big cities across the country. With the partnership between Steve Coon and his company, and the City of Canton, the Historic Onesto Lofts have the potential to drastically change the landscape of downtown and the city as a whole. ♦
